Pink eye (conjunctivitis) recommendations Red Cedar Medical Center Boyceville Community School District Menomonie School District

- Nonpurulent conjunctivitis (defined as pink conjunctiva with a clear, watery eye discharge without fever, eye pain, or eyelid redness) should not be restricted from school*, daycare*, or work except for the following reasons:
 - Restrict while they have eye discharge if they are unable to keep their hands out of their eyes.
 - Restrict while they have eye discharge if they are unable to practice good hand hygiene.
 - Direct patient caregivers restrict contact with patients while eyes are draining.
- Purulent conjunctivitis (defined as pink or red conjunctiva with white
 or yellow eye discharge, often with matted eyelids after sleep and
 eye pain or redness of the eyelids or skin surrounding the eye), should
 be restricted from school, day care or work (including health care
 workers) until examined by a physician and 24 hours after antibiotic
 treatment is started.
- Good hand hygiene is essential in preventing the spread of viral or bacterial conjunctivitis.
